Exploring infection control

Health and Social Care students have been learning about infection control. They explored different sources of infection, to how it is spread from person to person and even specific legislation that helps promote effective infection control.

For one particular assignment, students researched different types of personal protective equipment (PPE), such as gloves and face masks. In class, they have learnt the correct procedure of equipping as well as disposing of various PPE.

For their coursework, they examined the different situations in which health care professionals might use PPE.

Dear Ms Haynes-Sutherland


Thank you for contacting me about reform to the Gender Recognition Act. I am grateful that you have taken the trouble to write to me about this important matter.

LGBT+ people still face widespread discrimination, and it is clear that we must do more to enhance their rights and protections. As you will be aware, in July 2017, the Government committed to consulting on reforming the GRA and launched its consultation in July 2018. This consultation closed in October 2018. The Government has yet to publish the findings or respond. I am concerned that delay is troubling for LGBT+ people.

Last month, the Women and Equalities Minister – Liz Truss – said the Government is working to respond to the consultation and launch its proposals on the future of the GRA by the summer. She outlined three principles that the Government would be putting in place. These include: “the protection of single-sex spaces”, “making sure that transgender adults are free to live their lives as they wish without fear of persecution, whilst maintaining the proper checks and balances in the system” and “making sure that the under 18s are protected from decisions that they could make, that are irreversible in the future.”

I have written to Liz Truss, voicing your concerns – please find a copy of my letter enclosed. I will pass on her response as soon as I receive it. Thank you once again for contacting me. With all best wishes,

Flipped learning deepens understanding

Year 12 have been working on a "flipped learning" task looking at Vectors.

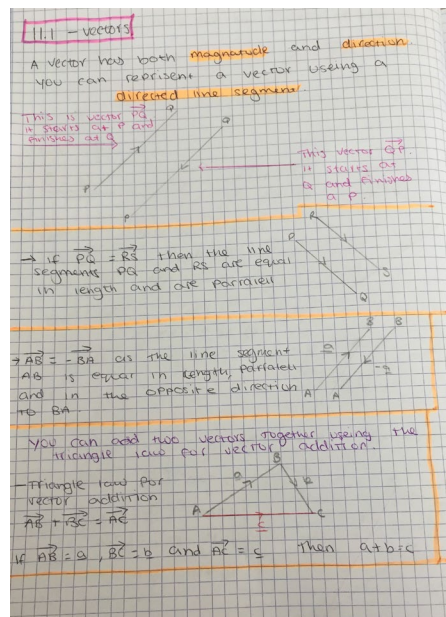
They were asked to investigate vectors using an online simulation which allowed them to explore vector mathematics in a truly interactive way.

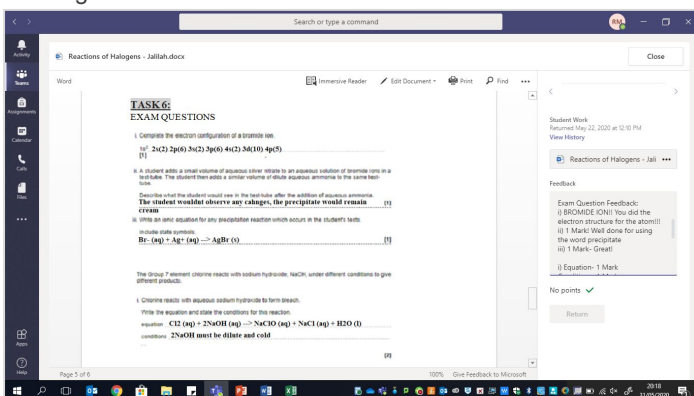
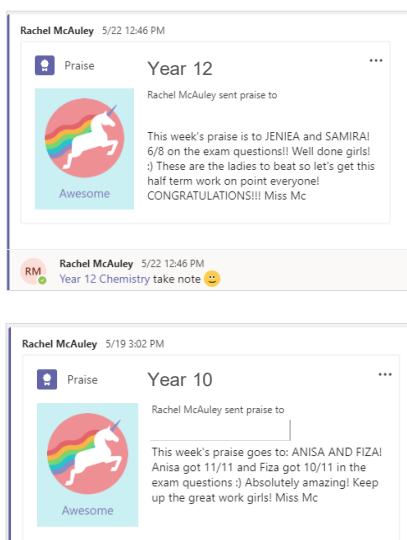
Helpful feedback improves skills

We have been really impressed to see students improving their answers, use of keywords and structure of their answers.

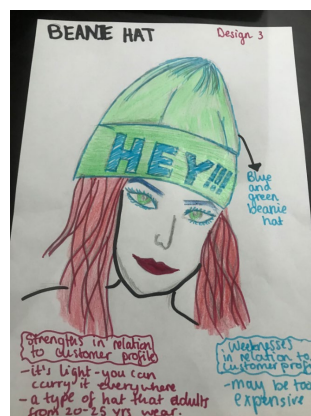
We have been using the 'praise tool' on Microsoft Teams to fully celebrate these students achievements and progress.
